Corn Planting

U.S corn planting passed the 30% complete stage recently with those Iowans planting 3.75 million acres the week of 4/18, but not so much here in the northeast. However, there are acres in the ground locally this week. But, I woke up on the 26th in the north country to snow covered ground. With that snow, however, came some much needed moisture in most of our service region, sprucing up the perennial forage crops and winter grains. Spring grains and newly established forage seedings will also benefit from this recent rainfall. Cooler air temperatures and moisture are keeping soil temps low. Please keep a close eye on winter grain crops as they begin to show progress. It is important to watch for weed and disease pressure as we have seen some powdery mildew appear in some areas. Quackgrass, winter annuals, cover crops, and potential no-till ground should be evaluated for burn down applications prior to annual crop plantings.

Recent weeks have shown some strength in the grain markets especially Soybean flirting in the 10.00 dollar plus ranges. Early indications from Argentina point to reduced yields of 5-7% and a weakening dollar with some interference from speculators. All of this is spurring the market, bringing corn and wheat along for the ride. Protecting crop yields by managing nutrients will help the grain producers profit from the upward swings and protect input feed cost for the livestock producer. Nutrient input costs are at very favorable levels in today's markets.

This may be getting repetitious but keep the 4R's of nutrient stewardship in mind when making crop nutrient decisions. Consider the Right Source of nutrients to ensure a balanced supply of essential nutrients, considering all sources in plant-available forms that suit individual soil properties. Also consider the Right Rate, assessing needs, crop varieties, realistic yield goals, soil supply (soil test), and plant demands. At the Right Time make applications and nutrient selections that match the dynamic of crop uptake, soil supply, nutrient loss risks, and field operations logistics, and make sure that they are in the Right Place as proper placement of nutrients will address soil and root dynamics, root activity, growth stages, nutrient movement in the soil, and specific crop needs at various plant development periods.

Right Source, Right Rate, Right Time, in the Right Place.

Current long range weather predicts warmer than normal conditions for the upcoming weeks through early May, aiding continued progress with field operations. Remember to be observant and safe through the upcoming planting and growing season .



Good Week for Field Work: New York had an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work.

New York reports cool nights, warm days and clear weather this week. Hay and small grains have sustained some damage from temperature fluctuations, but are otherwise progressing well. Some com is being planted. Cabbage and Pea plantings are proceeding rapidly. Damage to the fruit cop continues to be assessed. Existing trees are blossoming, new trees are being planted. Field activities for the week include tillage, seeding, applying fertilizer, manure and pesticides, repair and maintenance.
